Kull Appliance Service serves Strasburg for more than three decades

The Maytag man is supposed to be the loneliest man in town, but because of the quality of the Maytag appliances they didn't need much repair, thus the old saying.

Gary Kull is one of the busiest men in town. He has been in the Maytag and appliance business since 1980 when he rented the building he is in from Derry York to start his appliance business. In 2001, Gary experienced some health issues and decided to quit. He went to Menard's for a short time. However, he soon decided to reopen the business

Gary's dad Carl and his uncle Merl had a hardware business in the building that later became Cass's. They sold the building to Paul Montgomery in 1979 and it was called M & M True Value.

Gary sells major household appliances and you also can order what you want, but his business is mostly repair. He also sells DISH Network. He has two part-time workers, Ed Held and Chuck Wade, pictured on right

with Gary, left. Gary had the privilege of working with his dad for over 20 years. In 2001, his dad needed to rest, so he retired. Carl passed away in 2010 and is missed very much. His presence in the building was important. Gary's father-in-law Dwight Lading also worked for Gary for several years after his retirement and he still helps out whenever needed.

Gary is busy with his job at the Short Stop where he is on Tuesday and Thursday mornings ordering for the store. His day begins around 8 a.m. and ends whenever he can finish. He also stays busy volunteering for the village.

Liberty Unit 289 of the American Legion Auxiliary in Strasburg has chosen five young women to attend the 71st Session of the American Legion Auxiliary's Illini Girls State. Those attending are Tori Daniels, daughter of Todd and Tina Daniels; Sarah Luce, daughter of Mark and Melissa Luce; Jessica Telgmann, daughter of Don and Kim Telgmann; Kristina Weeden, daughter of Troy and Yong Weeden; and Shalyn Wildman, daughter of Mark and Jeanne Wildman, all of Strasburg.

Illini Girls State is a simulation patterned after the State of Illinois. Four hundred girls from various communities throughout the state will attend IGS, which is held on the campus of Eastern Illinois University from June 19-25. They will learn the way a two-party system works. At IGS, they have two fictitious political parties, the Nationalists and the Federalists. They will have caucuses, primary and general elections and participate in a party convention.

Delegates to IGS will elect city, county and state officials. They will learn the duties of various public offices - their functions, limitations and powers. Delegates will elect their legislature where members of the House and Senate will introduce, debate and pass their own bills. They will regulate their own cities, enforce their laws and prepare county projects.

Each of these young ladies will learn the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities as a citizen of Illini Girls State that will help them fully participate as an American citizen.

Trinity volleyball claims 2011 state title

Stewardson Trinity won the SIJHSAA State Championship on March 26. Trinity, the smallest school out of 70 in Class S, ended the year with a 44-2 record. The Cardinals achieved many smaller tournament titles throughout the year. We received 1st place at Christ Peoria Tournament in October, which was a 25 team tourney. Our team received the Sportsmanship Award and 5th Place at LSA (Lutheran State Association) state in November where Kendall Knop was named on the All State Team. Trinity won the SIJHSAA Regional Championship recently and then ended with the SIJHSAA State Championship—quite the success!

Our two losses of the year were probably two of our best games of the season, besides the state championship, and were to two very talented teams. Trinity Centralia (25-22,25-27,22-25) got 1st at LSA State and Mattoon (25-21,18-25,12-25) got 3rd in IESA 4A State. Initially the girls took the losses hard, but then realized they could be proud of how well they had played. We were honored when Mattoon asked us to play them before their regional. It was a huge compliment to the girls and to the school, and we went out and took the first game. The girls should be very proud. Our team is made up of three 8th graders, one 7th grader and two 6th graders with a 4th grader as a sub. We have to play teams with up to 20-plus 8th graders to pick from. The girls don't let that bother them. They know how to play hard and cover even harder. The girls begged for extra practices before big tournaments. Their determination and commitment to the team was unbelievable. They are an extraordinary group of girls and I will deeply miss my three that are graduating.

I'm also very proud of our 7th grade team. They played harder than I had ever imagined this year. There are three 4th graders that make up the team along with two 6th graders and one 7th grader. It was a very young team and I didn't expect to see much with them. They really showed me! They were 9-4. Out of our four losses, Mattoon, St. Peter and Stew-Stras, all went to three games and Effingham was just neck and neck. They have the determination to succeed. They see it in the older girls and it is contagious. They want that State Title too. I'm sad to see the season end, but we have so much to look back at and be thankful for. It was an amazing season! Thanks for all the support! It is truly appreciated!

Stremming Centennial Farm

In 1892, Frederick Stremming Sr. purchased 80 acres of farmland in Richland Township, just west of Strasburg. He sold 40 acres to someone (who later sold it or gave it to Elvis Presley). Then in 1973, Theodore Stremming, son of Frederick, purchased the 40 acres.

After the death of Theodore and his wife, the farm was passed



down to Floyd Stremming, who is now the owner of 35 acres after selling five acres to his daughter Phyllis and her husband Jim Weiss. They have built a beautiful log home on their 5 acres with a big pond. They can sit and watch the deer and other wildlife all summer and winter from their house.

It was named a Centennial farm in August of 2010, when Phyllis and Jim filled out the paperwork in Springfield. This farm has now been in the 119 years in the Stremming family.

Although Floyd doesn't farm the land now his cousin Gaylord farms for him. Gilbert

Stremming farmed for him for a while before Gaylord took on the chore. The Stremming family must be so proud of the farm. It will continue to stay in the family, as Phyllis has a son, Jason, who will someday inherit the farm. We are glad to have the Weiss family living in the Strasburg area, as they are active in the Lions Club and other activities.

His knowledge of plants is astonishing.

Have you ever had questions about the flowers or plants you have in your yard or garden? If you do, then Gideon has the answer. He is so sharp when it comes to flowers and plants, even trees. He knows the Latin names of most of them. This past January Gideon participated in the Postsecondary Agricultural Student Organization Horticulture contest. He took first place and then in March 2011, he participated in the National PAS Conference where he placed third in the nation as an Ornamental Horticulture Specialist and Individual Floriculture.

During the competition, he was going against 100 to 150 people and some of the things he had to answer were to identify plants by their Latin name and practical greenhouse mathematics. For example, he had to know how many plants he could grow in a certain square footage, the general knowledge and care of flowers and arrangements. He also had to give an impromptu speech on a horticulture subject.

He may show you around his yard and garden later this summer when everything is growing good.

Gideon is finishing his freshman year at Lake Land College and currently works for Barkley Farms in Paris, where he has been helping with propagating tropical plants. This is something he really enjoys.

Long-time industrial landmark removed

The Strasburg bulk plant fuel tanks, which were an industrial landmark at the village for decades, were removed on April 6. These tanks held diesel, gas, kerosene, heating oil and furnace oil. They have been there for years, possibly as far back as 1923. The bulk shed has also been dated to then.

The Strasburg bulk plant stopped storing fuel in 2007. An updated plant was built in Cowden and now houses the fuel that is used for customers in this area and surrounding areas.

Local sources recall Martin G. Ulmer running the bulk plant in the 1920's for Standard Oil. Clarence Buesking took on the job after him. Gary Wirth and Macari's of Shelbyville took over the operation of the plant from 1976-1985. At that time, the local operators managed the company. In 1985, Miller Oil took ownership of the bulk plant. Brad Ohnesorge has been the local dealer for this area since then.
